The water department officials are very lethargic and the meter readers are not doing their jobs well.

It takes nearly 20 minutes to read each meter after removing the dirt and slime which gets accumulated.

In this scenario, Jeeter the meter reader can only read about 10 to 12 meters a day and he needs to remove nearly 3 cubic feet of dirt and put the dirt in his truck.

We are in 2017 and the meters are defective and outdated, giving erratic readings which will be not be fair for residents and the utilities department.

My bill is around \$200 a month, which is miserably excessive unless one will be in the shower for four hours. My water consumption last month was 16,000 gallons which physically is not possible as the industry standard stipulates 100 gallons per day per person with factor of safety built in.

It is about time that our elected and appointed personnel discuss the issue for a tangible resolution of not billing properly to the consumers.

There are two sides to every tax plan

When I read Rants & Raves, the one thing that bothers me is the one-sided opinion of the contributors.

For example, last week, a contributor wrote that the new tax plan would hurt the middle class.

I believe it behooves everyone to watch all the channels with an open mind, then analyze the news and ascertain the chaff from the wheat and make a thought-out determination.

Here is a quick rundown of the new

tax bill. The new tax bill reduces the number of brackets from seven to three

12 percent, 25 percent and 35 percent. This may hurt some of us if we were between 13 percent and 24 percent brackets inclusive as we will now go to the 25 percent bracket. There may be another bracket at 35 percent. However, since the income levels have not been determined, we cannot ascertain how we will be affected.

There will be an increase in standard deductions and child tax credit. Standard deductions will be doubled and child tax credit will be increased and a provision of \$500 tax credit for dependent care will be added.

Itemized deductions will be eliminated with the exception of home mortgages, charitable donations, higher education benefits and retired security. Note: A majority of taxpayers do not qualify nor itemize itemized Since the standard deductions will be doubled, it should make up for some of the items no longer eligible for deduction. The doubling of standard deductions will be beneficial to those who do not itemize.

deductions.

The estate tax will be eliminated as this tax has been taxing property that has already been taxed and paid for.

Corporate taxes will be reduced to 20 percent, making the U.S. compatible with foreign countries whose lower corporate taxes have lured many companies offshore. These corporations with proper incentives should want to come back to the U.S., bringing with them more jobs and tax money to boost the American economy.

month for medical insurance and \$400 a month for two storage units containing all their possessions. They were getting a mere \$15 a month in food stamps because they were making too much money - but living in their van.

The lady did not know where to start to try to solve her immediate problems.

First

She needed help, most of which involved where to go for help.

Health

As questions were asked, it became apparent that what she initially called about was the tip of the iceberg. What she really needed was more information on the many programs available in Brevard that could help her with food, housing, and disability services.

We might say that this is a rare case, but in fact it occurs rather often. We just do not hear about it. Our ignorance does not mean that such happenings are not important or do not exist.

On the contrary, these cases underscore the need for more education and people in Brevard cannot be effective if no one knows about them. That is why organizations like Helping Seniors that inform, educate, and connect people to the help they need are such an important part of the care equation. The title of this article is a wake-up call:

All of us should be more aware of the many nonprofits that exist to serve others. Finding out that people who desperately need help, especially with food, only receive \$15 a month in assistance demonstrates the urgency of our mission. This type of information gathering also underscores the need for a County Aging plan that can bring together community resources to plan for the future.
