Recent move solidifies advocacy for seniors

have been writing this column since 2012 when Helping Seniors was founded. From the beginning we knew that one of our main charges would be to advocate for the elderly. We have taken a big step toward that goal with our recent move to 2401 N. Harbor City Blvd., Suite 134. This location, former Keiser University and now Unity of Melbourne, offers space to host events that will help promote seniors causes throughout Brevard County.

My own senior status has made me aware of the many issues that remain unresolved in our community. It may seem I am on an endless loop when writing about the need for a Brevard County aging plan, eldercare endowment, senior advocacy and education, and funding of local nonprofits. The reason I repeat myself is because seniors still do not know what services and programs are available for them here in Brevard.

You may ask why a private citizen has to advocate for these things. After all, we pay taxes to fund the Brevard Housing and Human Services Department, which has charge of the Brevard Commission on Aging. What does this department do to justify?

Did it even comment when the Board of County Commissioners voted to defund all nonprofit funding from the Brevard County General Revenue Fund?

A search of social services rendered by

other United States counties shows that Brevard provides minimal support to nonprofits that serve young and old alike. Seniors and children both require assistance, for it is at the beginning and end of the life cycle that these most vulnerable of our citizens need our help. The main challenge is to generate funding to support such programs.

Recent Florida Today headlines have focused on the need to fund the Children's Services Council of Brevard. I was a member of the Council for nine years, trying to foster development of a program that would unite all of Brevard in support of youth and elders. The best way to assist these two equally deserving elements of society is a joint effort, not pitting one against the other.

Does a current lack of financial support mean we should forego programs to assist identified risk areas? Does it make sense to fund the Children's Services Council without a complete understanding of its need, objectives, and ultimate cost when we

Company to hold open auditions for 'Nutcracker'

BREVARD COUNTY — This month, aspiring dancers from around Brevard County will have a new opportunity to audition for Space Coast Ballet Company's annual production of "The Nutcracker."

Prior to this year, the company's "Nutcracker" included dancers from the company's school — which has closed — in addition to guest performers.

The open audition format is part of a new approach to the company's leadership.

"In the past SCBC has hired their artistic director from local dance studios," the company announced on Facebook in June. "We are now independent of any dance studio. We feel that our movement in this direction will encourage participation of all dancers in Brevard County.

The Open World Dance Foundation, a nonprofit whose motto is "united by dance," began providing artistic direction for the company in the spring.

The collaboration will continue at least through the Dec. 1 "Nutcracker" performance, said Open World's founder and president, Ekaterina Shchelkanova, a former soloist with American Ballet Theatre who was a guest performer for the Space Coast Ballet Company in the early 2000s.

"The Open World Dance Foundation is looking forward to joining forces with the Space Coast Ballet to bring a beautiful production to the Space Coast, and more importantly, the opportunity to everyone who wants to learn more about theater and art," Ms. Shchelkanova said.

Run by Ms. Shchelkanova and Vice President Anton Boytsov, the foundation operates an Elite Training Program for a small group of dancers and holds a variety of ballet workshops and training events.

The foundation also produces ballets in Florida and elsewhere that are open to dancers of all ages and abilities.

Such experience with large-scale productions featuring local participants is one of the main reasons the company approached the foundation for artistic direction, Ms. Shchelkanova said.

Additionally, like the company's productions, the foundation's have also included guest performers.

When it premiered in Houston, the foundation's 2016 production of "Cinderella" featured Misty Copeland, who is well-known in the ballet world for becoming the first African-American female principal dancer with American Ballet Theatre.

The cast of 200 included 123 local children who gained experience in a professional theater environment while also participating in educational activities covering history and culture, Ms. Shchelkanova noted.

"Open World Dance Foundation is about sharing," the foundation's website explains. "From the very beginning we wanted to share love for our art form, the history and tradition of it, so it inspires others and leads them into a better yet

unknown future."

"That's why it's called Open World –" Ms. Shchelkanova added, "to open doors of the professional world to any member of the community."

Auditions for "The Nutcracker" will be held Sunday, Aug. 19 in rooms 158 and 160 of the King Center Rotunda at the Maxwell C. King Center for the Performing Arts, 3865 N. Wickham Road, Melbourne

blankets."

Rev. Peters said there are also several church and nonprofit groups that have agreed to offer hot meals and overnight supervision on cold nights, although more teams are needed.

Mosaic has partnered with Volunteers of America, which will provide case management for the guests to ensure that they not only have a warm place to stay, but also have support services available. "We are hopeful we can get some electrical and plumbing work done at the church so we can install a washer and dryer," said Rev. Peters. "We'd also like to see about obtaining a mobile shower to offer hot showers on the cold nights."

Mosaic Church opened its doors a year ago and Rev. Peters said the congregation has been supportive of the shelter idea.

"They have a heart to serve and care for those in need," said Rev. Peters. "I believe as Christians we are called to live out our faith actively."

Discussion of a cold weather shelter arose from a Poverty Solutions Workshop held at

Palm Bay City Hall in late March and a follow-up workshop in late May. The charge to develop a cold night shelter in south Brevard County and to move Palm Bay's homeless population toward supportive housing has been led by Palm Bay resident Thomas Rebman, who was recently recruited to serve in the volunteer role as the city's social services administrator.

After the May meeting, partnerships were quickly formed with churches including Mosaic and Tomoka, as well as Ascension Catholic Church, Centerpointe Church and the Salvation Army of Melbourne.

Sponsors to date include the Greater Palm Bay Chamber of Commerce, Palm Bay Rotary Club, Brevard Homeless Coalition, Volunteers of America, Tapestry Sharing Ministries and Community of Hope.

Brevard County Emergency Management designates a cold night when the temperature is expected to be at 45 degrees or below. This is the first cold weather shelter to be located in Palm Bay. Other cold night shelters in Brevard County include His Place Ministries in Melbourne, Central Brevard Sharing Center in Cocoa and North Brevard Coalition of Human Services in Titusville.
